La Center School District Library Annual Report 2022-2023

Elementary Library:

The total number of classes using the library was 36 classes in grades K-5. Each grade receives a 30-minute time of library instruction and checkout. During the 2022-2023 school year 800+ patrons checked out 50,761 titles.

Collection Value: \$301,406.07

Aug. 30 Elementary Library Meet and Greet. Library tours to families 1-3 p.m.

Sept. 12 Susan Cushwa joined our library team as the elementary library technician.

Oct. 24-Nov. 4 Scholastic Book Fair. Total sales of \$15,229.21 with over \$7000 in profits for the library to spend at the Scholastic Catalog online. Leadership students from the high school volunteered to assist students.

Dec. 8 Observed Transitional Kindergarten at Kalama and met with their Librarian to discuss how to meet the needs of TK students.

Jan. 18 Transitional Kindergarten start library.

March 2 Read Across America Day. Middle School students from Mrs. Hollopeter's Pop Lit class partnered up with Mrs. Gray's 1st graders to read Dr. Seuss books and celebrate reading.

April Grades K-3 participated in the Washington Children's Choice Picture Book Award by casting a final vote. 110,202 students in the state of Washington voted.

April 10 Visiting Clark/Cowlitz Fire and Rescue member Matthew Cushwa read to 1st graders and Kindergarteners.

May 15-19 Scholastic BOGO Book Fair. Total sales of \$13,687.51. All profits went directly to students as buy one get one free. Leadership students from the high school volunteered to assist students.

June 5-9 the library collaborated with the FVRL (Fort Vancouver Regional Library) to promote their summer reading program.

Middle School Library:

Middle School students receive individualized instruction based on needs. During the 2022-2023 school year 378+ patrons checked out 9,918 titles.

Collection Size: 7,218 titles and 8,341 copies

Collection Value: \$165,167.85

Aug. 31 Middle School Chrome Books distributed to students 6th period.

Sept.18-24 The Middle School Library participated in the ALA (American Library Association) banned book week by presentations to 8th grade Language Arts classes about banned/challenged books.

Nov. 30-Dec. 2 Scholastic Bookfair. Total sales of \$3010.15 with over \$1000 in profits for the library to spend at the Scholastic Catalog online.

March 2 Read Across America Day. Middle School students from Mrs. Hollopeter's Pop Lit class partnered up with Mrs. Gray's 1st graders to read Dr. Seuss books and celebrate reading.

May 10-12 Scholastic BOGO Book Fair. Total sales of \$2171.30. All profits went directly to students as buy one get one free.

June 12 All Middle School Chrome Books collected from students to inventory, repair, barcode and store for checkout the next school year.

High School Library:

High School students receive individualized instruction based on needs. During the 2022-2023 school year 520+ patrons checked out 4,731 titles.

Collection Size: 7,324 titles and 9,199 copies Collection Value: \$181,065.29

Chrome Books were distributed during Wildcat kickoff and at the beginning of the school year. The library checks out Chrome Books to students, sends Chrome Books to the Technology Department for repairs and assists students and staff with Chrome Book concerns.

Sept. 19 Daryl Moore joined our library team as the high school library technician.

Sept. 18-Sept. 24 The High School Library participated in the ALA (American Library Association) banned book week by displaying books and providing relevant information about the history of "Challenged Books" across the United States.

March 10 I assisted Kate Stevens in her AP government class by discussing media and the government. We covered bias in the media along with awareness of news sources and the credibility of digital news. Resources from my Media Literacy Grant from OSPI were provided.

At the end of the school year the library collected Chrome Books from students to inventory, repair, barcode and store for checkout the next school year.
